### Industrial Archaeology in Surrey

The appeal made in Bulletin No. 13 for members who are interested in Industrial Archaeology to write to the editor has produced only one reply. Members of the Thames Basin Archaeological Observers' Group seem to be more active in this direction. In the Group's latest Newsletter (No 28, obtainable from Harvey Sheldon, 44 Howitt Road, N.W.3, price 1/3 post free) there is published a provisional list of Greater London's Industrial Monuments. The list includes the following items within this Society's area:

Windmills: Brixton Windmill; Wandsworth Common Windpump. Wimbledon Windmill.

South Nutfield: Medieval pottery (TQ 312492)

Medieval pottery has been found by Miss M. Deacon and her brother in a stream bank remote from present habitation. The sherds are of a sandy fabric resembling Limpsfield ware, and come from at least one vessel which had pressed vertical strips as decoration. The sherds have been donated to the Guildford Museum by the finders.

#### Thames Ditton: Neolithic worked flints

A Neolithic flint skin-scraper was recently found in the garden of 59 Speer Road, Thames Ditton (TQ 15606742) an area which in our ancestors' time must have been an unpleasant swamp on the edge of the then wide, shallow and tidal Thames. Its location was the real interest as I had not heard of similar finds in this area.

Search however revealed a Neolithic adze in the Kingston Museum found in Thames Ditton and in The Surrey Comet for 11th January, 1908, a Mr. Lavers-Smith informed readers that on vacant land at the back of Effingham Road (north side) was a mound of gravel containing pre-historic flint instruments consisting of arrow-heads, javelin-heads and various scraping and boring implements, &c., some specimens being on show at Long Ditton Schools.

Today this site (TQ 170668) is divided between Long Ditton Recreation Ground and the reservoirs of the Metropolitan Water Board. It would therefore seem that this hoard and the collection at the School are lost without trace. Perhaps further research in this district might prove of more permanent value.

Industrial monuments have been defined by the C.B.A as "any buildi or other fixed structure (especially of the period of the Industrial Revoltion) which, either alone or in association with plant and equipmes illustrates, or is significantly connected with, the beginnings of industrial a technological processes including means of communication". The compil of the provisional list (John Ashdown, 53 Sudbourne Road, S.W.2) wor like to receive items for the revision of this list. The editor of the Bulles would still like to hear from members and others who are investigati any aspect of Industrial Archaeology in Surrey or who are recording listing industrial monuments.

#### Post-Medieval Ceramic Research Group

This group was formed in order to make a study of what is undoubted one of the most interesting and important periods in the history of Engli ceramics. The period in question is that which lies between c. 1500 at c. 1750 which is one of considerable change in the methods and types pottery used and is also one in which considerable quantities of ceram were imported into this country from the whole of western Europe at the Far East. Furthermore, it is a period in which there was a large exp trade of ceramics from England to the colonies and other newly form nations. We need to know a great deal more about the ceramics of the period and it is the aim of the Group not just to study a piece of potter its artistic merit but to study it from every angle, to understand manufacture, the growth and development of the industry, the export a import types and the various influences that were brought to bear from this great period of English potting.

The Group has amongst its ranks archaeologists, art historians a working potters. It meets twice yearly in various places in the British Is and at these meetings it studies local collections of post-medieval ceram in museums or in private hands, together with material from recent excations. Membership is open to all for a subscription of 10/- per ann and the Group publishes a *Broadsheet*. In this publication the ite published include papers read at the conferences, extracts from documents, and up to date information on recent work.

# Ash: 17th century pottery (SU 895506)

During 1965 it was discovered that a 17th century pottery existed at Ash on the site of cottages demolished to make way for new houses at the junction of Ash Street and Grange Road. Quantities of sherds including wasters were found in the garden of one of the houses, and in the grounds of the adjoining Manfield School. Much pottery, which undoubtedly came from the same source, was also found on the site of the multi-storey car park at Guildford in 1963. All the material in question is either in Guildford Museum or will be deposited there shortly.

The discovery of the Ash pottery is of considerable importance to the study of post-medieval ceramics, since the Ash products include some found in London excavations which had been supposed hitherto to be imports from the Low Countries. It is proposed to publish the significant material from the car park site in the Surrey Archaeological Collections.

# Carshalton: Wrythe Green (TQ 276652)

A note in Bulletin No. 4 described Woodcote House, Wrythe Green, and hinted at a possible threat to this building. Woodcote House is one of a series of buildings, dating mainly from the first half of the nineteenth century, that line the north west side of the Green. The other sides of the Green are at present mainly occupied by undistinguished examples of twentieth century building. Redevelopment is forecast for the north west side of the Green and a new motor road is rumoured to be planned to pass through the vicinity.

Local amenity and archaeological societies have made representations to the Planning Authorities in an attempt to preserve the nineteenth century property as far as possible. Much of it is of intrinsic interest as vernacular architecture and most of it has distinct group value. Woodcote House and Ferncot have individual value and representations have been made to the Minister to have Woodcote House placed on the statutory list.

#### Ewell: excavations in 1965

Excavations were conducted on two sites by the Nonsuch and Ewell Antiquarian Society A further season of work at Bourne Hall (TQ 219627) was directed as before by N. H. Nail. The trenches dug produced further evidence of medieval buildings and the two shallow ditches of probable R-B date, located originally in 1964, were traced further across the site.

Work in the grounds of Glyn House (TQ 221628) was directed by D. R. Cousins and M. Morris. A number of trenches in the southern part of the grounds produced evidence of medieval building, though no definite pattern can be established without further work. Traces of a cobbled area were also found. A trench dug behind No. 11 Church Street produced an 18th century assemblage such as might be expected from the yard behind an inn of that period.

# Ewell: Iron water wheel at Bourne Hall (TQ 219627)

The Nonsuch and Ewell Antiquarian Society have urged that this, one of the few "industrial monuments" in the Borough of Epsom and Ewell, be restored before decay advances much further. The Borough Council replied to the effect that the amount of repair work that would be necessary would be so much as to reduce the historic value of the wheel to a point where the repairs required would become unjustifiable.
