SOUTHWARK AND LAMBETH

EXCAVATIONS ORGANISED BY THE SOUTHWARK ARCHAEOLOGICAL EXCAVATIONS COMMITTEE

LOCAL NOTES

Dorking: Pottery (TQ 164502)

Sherds of Romano-British and Medieval pottery were given to Guildford Museum in April by Mr. E. A. Boyle of Chalk Pit Piece. Yew Tree Road, Dorking. They were found in the donor's garden, but redistribution of the soil by the builders in terracing the site of houses in this vicinity makes it impossible to locate the original position of the finds, although it appears that this must have been within a comparatively short distance. The size of the R-B sherds indicates an occupation site and not merely a casual scatter.

Dunsfold: Romano-British pits (TQ 023368)

The discovery of R-B rubbish pits at this site near High Billingshurst was reported in the Bulletin for April 1965. A further pit was located nearby in March this year while the field adjoining the ditch was being ploughed. This pit contained more first century pottery similar to the previous finds, and also many lumps of partly burnt material, a specimen of which has been examined by Mr. B. C. Worssam of the Geological Survey. In his opinion, this may be a shrave (a form of concretion found in some places on Weald clay which was smelted for its iron content at early iron-working sites). The material from the pit is in the Guildford Museum.

Oatlands Palace, by J. W. Lindus Forge. 24pp., 2 illustrations. (Walton and Weybridge Historical Society. Price 3/- from R. Hargrave, 16 Annett Road. Walton-on-Thames.)

The Introduction to this, Paper No. 1 of the Walton and Weybridge Historical Society, promises publication by the Society from time to time of transcripts and 'more scholarly papers' on the history and architecture of Oatlands. This is welcome news, for modern team-research into this second vanished hunting-lodge of the latter years of Henry VIII is long overdue, 'It is', writes Mr. Lindus Forge, 'humiliating to confess that we still are uncertain of exactly where the palace stood'.

The present pamphlet is intended to serve as an introduction to those which are to follow. It outlines in 'frankly popular' style the story of the building work and the history of the palace through Tudor and Stuart times to its destruction after the execution of Charles I. The author expects later research to modify some of the details of what he has written; but it is in many ways a pity that those responsible for its publication allowed so absorbing and (surely?) marketable a piece of work to be issued in duplicated type-script and with a number of lapses of spelling and punctuation. It was worth the dignity of print, even though a revised edition may later be needed.

Limpsfield: Flint axe

A ground and polished flint axe, found about 1900 by the donor's brother, was given to Guildford Museum in April this year by Prof. K. W. Braid of Aberdeen. The location of the find is described as a hop field belonging to Boulthurst Farm.

Limpsfield: Earthwork at Hell Shaw (TQ 39135499)

An apparently unrecorded earthwork of Medieval or later date has been discovered at Hell Shaw, Limpsfield. It is rectangular and is clearly delineated by a single bank and external ditch. Four unglazed Medieval sherds have been recovered from the surface inside the enclosure.

The earthwork is to be published in a forthcoming edition of the Collections.

Southwark: Madron Street (TQ 333784)

Members of the London Natural History Society (Archaeological Section), directed by V. F. Bignell, recently attempted to carry out by augering a search for evidence for the course of Watling Street at a cleared site in Madron Street. Layers of bricks and concrete allowed only one boring to be completed and no satisfactory conclusions could be reached.

Titsey: Earthwork at Kitchen Grove (TO 39555675)

An apparently unrecorded earthwork of Medieval or later date has been found to the north of Cheverells Farm, Titsey. It is, in effect, three embanked enclosures laid end to end, two having fairly clearly defined entrances. Thirteen unglazed sherds of Medieval pottery have been recovered from the surface, including a slashed jug handle of a type commonly associated with the Limpsfield kiln group ascribed to the thirteenth century.

The earthwork is to be published in a forthcoming edition of the Collections.

The archaeological field group has found what appears to be traces of an extensive field system and would like to know whether this has been noted previously.

Witley Common: Barrow (TQ 923399)

A large and well preserved bowl barrow has been found on Witley Common. It is approximately 100 ft, in diameter and eight feet high. There is no trace of a surrounding ditch. It is approximately one quarter of a mile from the barrow opposite the Half Moon Inn, which is a scheduled ancient monument.

REVIEWS

The Case for a Regional Educational Museum in Croydon. C.N.H.S.S. Price 3/- from P. W. Scowan, 1 Chaucer Cottages, Pilgrim's Way. Croham Road, South Croydon.)

This document was published early this year and summarises the history of attempts to obtain museum provision in Croydon from 1866 to date. Some account of the Grange Wood Museum and its unhappy fate is given, and brief notes on some sources of more or less available material suitable for various kinds of museum applications either held by the Society, or in the hands of individuals or other organisations.

It is argued that a Croydon Museum should — certainly in its display and amateur research departments — limit itself to the Croydon area. The scope of the museum should be wide enough, ultimately, to include some treatment of the natural history, geography, archaeology. history and present-day aspects of Croydon and its region. Emphasis should be put upon good display technique, the aim being to make the museum an active part of further education within the town.

In association with the regional museum, there should be a school museums service. The scope of this could be made a little wider than that of the museum itself.

The project has, as always, shewn up as the kind of thing which many people will hail as a good idea, but which few can find sufficient time to help towards success. The Croydon Natural History and Scientific Society's Officers and Council members have had far less time than they would have liked to devote to the matter.

Nevertheless, progress so far has been more striking than it was in some previous attempts. The Libraries Committee of the Borough Council has for consideration a proposal that a museum should be started in the Town Hall when new municipal offices are opened shortly. A decision cannot be expected until other plans for the building have been considered. The Local Education Authority is examining the museum service proposal very sympathetically. Expressions of support for the proposals have been received from all or most of the leading cultural and educational organisations within the Borough.

The next development, in the absence of any encouraging moves from the Borough Council, may be the development of a Council of Croydon Cultural and Educational Organizations to speak in concert for their members, who are, in total, a significant proportion of the population of Croydon.

Lewis Carroll and Guildford. 4pp. plus 9 illustrations. (Guildford Corporation. Price 1/-).

Charles Dodgson first came to Guildford three years after the publication of Alice, searching for a home for his six sisters. This he found at The Chestnuts near the castle ruins. The family remained connected with Guildford for more than sixty years. Guildford Museum contains many records and relics of Lewis Carroll, mainly in the Dodgson Family Collection which was placed on permanent loan in Guildford Muniment Room in 1965. Other material had previously been acquired from time to time and a selection is kept on permanent display. This well produced pamphlet gives a brief but adequate introduction to this collection and is illustrated by reproductions of items from it.
